Imagine Who You Want to Be


Before you start exploring your options, it's important to take a good look at who you are, including what you like to do, what you're good at, as well as your capabilities and learning style. Career GPS: Finding Your Way in the World of Work

In the future, sixty five percent (65%) or two thirds (2/3) of jobs in Newfoundland and Labrador will require some form of post-secondary education and or training. More than ever, young people are going to need education and or training beyond high school in order to compete in the future economy! Young people are now likely to experience up to 25 jobs (with elements of multiple occupations) in up to 5 different industry sectors during their lives. These 25 jobs may span a number of different occupations, such as skilled trades or health care, just to name two. When it comes time to apply, reapply or retrain for these jobs, it is important that students have opportunities within their abilities.



The demand for skilled workers in Newfoundland and Labrador is growing rapidly! Some of the greatest demands will be in the skilled trades and technical professions, and in the next ten years, **skill shortages are predicted in all industries.**¹



What does all this mean? It means that Newfoundland and Labrador is a province of choice, a province where you can **build your career success! A province where you can work, live and play!**

Career Planning - A Process

Career planning is a process that involves matching your interests, skills, values and abilities with occupations and activities that are suitable for you. It involves **ongoing** discovery of **"Who am I?" "What's out there?"** And **"how do I get there?"** Not only is the world changing at a really fast pace but as you get older and experience new things, your strengths and interests may change too.



There are several building blocks in the career planning process that will help you build your career in today's world. They are: **DREAM SEE GET DO.**

These building blocks are the foundation for career building in a world that is rapidly changing. A world where technology is creating major shifts in the way we communicate, work and live on a daily basis. We don't even know what some of the jobs of the future will be but we do know that career planning isn't a one-shot deal or simply that thing you do when you finish high school! These four building blocks can - and should - be re-visited or even visited in different orders. Quite simply, career development is a lifelong journey so get ready for the ride!

Career Development – The Building Blocks

Dream: Create the Vision

In this stage, we create a positive vision of our future selves. This involves using our imagination to create an image of what we want our life to look like in the future. Share your dream with a friend or family member or anyone you feel comfortable with. Sometimes it helps to write about or draw a picture of your image.

So ... **start dreaming** and dream big!



***See:** Look at What's Out There*

This stage encourages us to look at the world around us and at options that are available now and in the future. Get: **Develop Skills**

In this stage, we have the opportunity to develop our skills, reflect on our learning, and receive feedback and coaching. These various steps will help us develop skills that are in demand within the labour market.

Do: *Create a Plan*


In this stage a career plan is created. Information developed within the other stages is used to set goals, make decisions and create action steps. Goals for students at this stage may involve exploring options for life after high school, deciding on post secondary education or training that will lead to occupations of interest and finding ways to pay for it.

So ... **do** aim high and achieve your potential. Keep your options open and **create a plan** that works for you! Make sure to include time lines and the people who can help you with your action steps.



Beyond High School - Options

There's so much to consider when planning life after high school. Sometimes it's difficult to focus. Where do you start?



Let's look at the following options so you can get a handle on your career, life, future and the opportunities available in Newfoundland and Labrador.

University - Some jobs require a university degree. A degree program generally takes longer to complete than other types of post-secondary education however. On average, jobs that require a university degree have higher earnings than other types of post-secondary education. Tuition costs for a university education in Newfoundland and Labrador are among the lowest in Canada. Memorial University has two campuses in St. John's, including the Marine Institute, Canada's leading centre of fisheries and marine training, and Grenfell Campus in Corner Brook. If you are interested in pursuing university level studies closer to home the Comprehensive Arts and Science (CAS) Transfer: College-University program at College of the North Atlantic may be for you. Check out the CAS Transfer program available at the Burin, Carbonear, Grand Falls-Windsor, Happy Valley-Goose Bay, and Labrador West Campuses of College of the North Atlantic. College - College often provides more hands on learning and is typically less expensive than university or private school. Earnings are generally higher with a college education than without any post secondary training and or education. Newfoundland and Labrador's public college system is College of the North Atlantic. Check out www.cna.nl.ca or call 1-888-982-2268 for further information.

Apprenticeship - Are you interested in learning more about occupations in the skilled trades? Newfoundland and Labrador's education and apprenticeship system can help you get the training and experience you need to become a professional, skilled tradesperson. Private Training - Private schools and training tend to have lower student/teacher ratios and class sizes, but can be more expensive than public school. For a full list of private training institutes in the Newfoundland and Labrador, please visit www.aes.gov.nl.ca/postsecondary/private.html

Work - Maybe you want to start working and earning a salary right away. For assistance finding a job, check out your local Career Work Centre, or try out Newfoundland and Labrador's comprehensive job search and posting website at www.jobsinnl.ca

Train For It

Remember that in the future sixty five percent (65%) or two thirds (2/3) of jobs in Newfoundland and Labrador will require post-secondary education so you will need to explore your options. Pay For It

While post secondary education and or training can be costly there are a number of ways to help pay for it to make it an **option for everyone!**



Student Loans - The Canada – Newfoundland and Labrador Student Financial Assistance Program provides financial assistance to eligible residents of Newfoundland and Labrador who are pursuing post-secondary education. Assistance is available in both repayable loans and non-repayable grants. For further information visit Student Aid online at www.aes.gov.nl.ca/studentaid/.

Scholarships - A scholarship is a monetary award based on merit or excellence in a specific area such as athletics, music, volunteerism, etc. Not all scholarships are based on academic average or financial need. Family Contribution - Some families are able to help pay for your post secondary education through savings such as RESPs or through other means.


Student Contribution - You can help pay the cost of your post secondary education through savings from summer jobs or part time work outside school hours. Check out summer employment programs available through the provincial and federal government or search the student section on www.jobsinnl.ca.

Military – The Canadian Forces subsidizes education plans for some university and college programs. A recruiter can help you choose the best education plan for you. Check out www.forces.ca for further information.



Impact of Learning on Your Financial Future

Did you know that learning and higher education levels lead to **higher earnings** and lower risk of unemployment?

Did you know that those who completed their education with a high school diploma earned on average **\$4,300 more per year** than those without a high school diploma. That's a trip down south or a year's worth of monthly payments on a reallllllly nice car!

Did you know that Canadians with a post-secondary education enjoy as much as **\$23,000 on average more per year** than those with a high school diploma?
² Multiply this over 30 plus years of work and this translates to upwards of a **quarter million dollars!**

3. Learning is Continuous


Learning, in all contexts, is a continuous, lifelong process. Learning, work and skills development are intertwined as we engage in our career-building experiences.
